### MESSAGE FROM FATHER BROWN

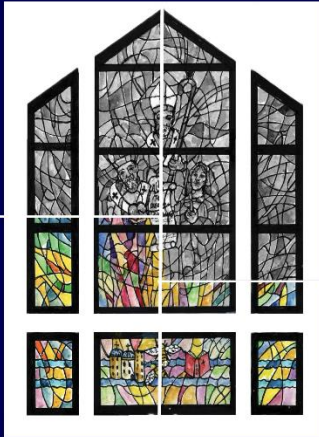
About twice each year, I ask the question: "What is so ordinary about Ordinary Time." In upper case letters ordinary refers to a season on our Calendar of Worship (aka, Liturgical Year) which comprises 33 of the 52 Sundays of the Calendar Year. The precise dates on which they fall can vary from one year to another, mainly because of the date of Easter, the most important day of the year, varies. The 33 weeks of Ordinary Time as a whole are divided into two segments which, again, will vary in length. This year, we have six Sundays of Ordinary Time before the Season of Lent. After the six weeks of Lent, the Easter Season (7 weeks), the Ascension (40 days after Easter), and Pentecost (50 days after Easter), we resume Ordinary Time, and follow it until the end of the year.

But we are jumping too far ahead of ourselves; let's get back to the original question: "What is so ordinary about "Ordinary Time"? There are at least two meanings of the word ordinary. We normally understand it with synonyms like plain, routine, uneventful, etc. The Church looks at the Latin root word, *ordinis*, which means rule, regulation, guide, etc. Both usages apply when we talk about Ordinary Time. The guidance or rule for how and when we observe this season in our worship is actually spelled out in a small handbook, which deacons, priests, bishops, etc., refer to as an Ordo. But the common usage also applies. These Sundays and weeks are called Ordinary, because they simply do not have a special designation, such as, Easter, Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, etc.

However, I like to take the reflection a bit further and consider what it is that we do, on all the Sundays, whether with a special designation or as Ordinary. And, keeping with our focus on the word, let's consider its basis in what Jesus did in teaching us to remember Him. He took bread; He took wine; He took ordinary food from His ordinary table and offered it to His ordinary friends. Sure, He went beyond ordinary to Ordinary, which we acknowledge with our faith. But just as he invited those ordinary fishermen to do extraordinary missions, by spreading His Word and becoming His Body and Blood living in the world, so He invites us to do the same. What's so ordinary about that!

## RECENT AND CURRENT PARISH OFFERINGS

### 2024 Opportunities for Life

In the name of the parish, a donation was made to Opportunities for Life in the amount of \$262.50, which represents 7.5% of an average weekend offering. The weekend before the anniversary of Roe vs. Wade (January 22), the four Kentucky dioceses took up a collection as part of the Kentucky bishops' unified message advocating for a pro-life culture in our Commonwealth. In the Archdiocese of Louisville, funds from this collection will provide resources to pregnant women and new families in crisis, including services through Walking With Moms in Need groups in many parishes and the Lifeline Fund maintained by Catholic Charities.
