MESSAGE FROM FATHER BROWN

The Traditional name for this Fourth Sunday of Lent is Laetare Sunday. The word means Rejoice, and my teachers taught that a good way to think about it was to rejoice that the six weeks of Lent were now half completed. It actually comes from the phrase which began the Latin Antiphon and Collect which was sung by choirs and priests, to open the Mass of the Sunday three weeks before Easter. “Laetare Jerusalem!” And the fact that Lent is half over is cause for rejoicing but, as they say on television info-mercials, “Wait there’s more!”

As we considered last week, our relationship with Christ which began in the sacramental waters of Baptism is a constant, on-going, new life.....the life of the redeemed. This means that we experience every aspect of our lives, the good the bad the ugly in terms of Jesus. Our physical limitations may not (or may) be as dramatic as the man in today’s gospel, but we have them, periodically and chronically. And, like the Samaritan woman at the well in last week’s story, we have character flaws; we are guilty of wrong-doing individually and collectively.

Both of these two aspects of the limitation in human life, physical/emotional illness and moral/character weakness, are part of sacramental redemption; and, they are the subject of the Sacraments of Anointing and Reconciliation. In four short verses, the Apostle James in his New Testament Letter (James 5:13-17), gives us the suggestion of these two sacraments. Of course, Jesus had earlier experienced anointing with oil and had spoken often about the forgiveness of sin. Lent is an especially good time to celebrate these sacraments because it is the season when we are spending so much time and energy focusing on Jesus in His human condition.

As with all seven sacraments in the Catholic tradition, Anointing and Reconciliation have experienced considerable renewal since the days when we referred to them as Extreme Unction and Penance/Confession. For example, Anointing is a Sacrament which we receive more frequently than in days gone by and Reconciliation is a Sacrament we can experience less frequently than in days gone by. Also, these two Sacraments were experienced individually and quite privately in the past; today, we are much more aware of the communal elements, and we can experience them in a group setting such as when we come for Mass. The richness of our sacramental system is one of the great benefits of our Catholic faith. Whether we are new to Catholicism or “cradle Catholics,” we can always refine our knowledge and polish our devotion to the Sacraments.
