MESSAGE FROM FATHER BROWN

In these weekly columns of late October and November, I have commented on some of the biblical teaching and ecclesiastical tradition regarding “ultimate questions” of life and death. In seminaries and schools of religious studies this is called eschatology or the study of final things. The Prophet Malachi in today’s first reading presents some downright scary imagery of what could await those who end up on the wrong side of the Lord’s judgement. Jesus too, is fairly graphic with His predictions in the Gospel. Saint Paul by contrast, admonishes the community at Thessalonica about some rather mundane issues. Last week though, he was telling them to ignore people who were speaking and writing to them about dire predictions of the end of time. Jesus’ own very clear message in this regard is contained in a passage from Matthew’s account captioned above on this page.

From time to time various people, famous and otherwise seem to go for their “15 minutes” of celebrity status by making predictions regarding the end of the world. Unfortunately, where they succeed is in causing innocent people needless anxiety and worry. The way to take fear out of our thoughts of the next life is of course to live well during this life. This is connected too as I often suggest, with the way in which we remember loved ones who have died. One element of this is our custom of intentional prayer for people who have died. (When we offer a Mass for people who are not deceased, we usually print initials rather than the full name in the bulletin).

The centerpiece of every Mass is remembering Jesus, that is, intentionally keeping His memory alive by our personal pledge to follow Him in our lives. Our custom is to apply the same idea to members of our families and communities. This has the double effect of expressing our affection for our dear ones and making ourselves better people in the process. In June of 1974, Saint Paul VI who served as Pope from 21 June of 1963 until 6 August of 1978, wrote an instruction suggesting that the offering of a donation for a Mass intention was a way of participating in the sacrificial aspect of the Mass. We regularly run an announcement in this regard in the bulletin; please know that the donation is welcome but not essential. If you would like to have loved ones remembered in this customary way, just let us know.

Another part of the legacy of Saint Pope Paul VI, is a document, the first words of which are, Verbum Dei or “The Word of God.” This contains the most important teaching about how Roman Catholics value and understand the Holy Bible. This one of four Dogmatic Constitutions produced by The Second Vatican Council, was promulgated by the Pope on 18 November of 1965, sixty years ago this Tuesday.
