MESSAGE FROM FATHER BROWN

The verse captioned in italics at the top of this page is known to Jewish people as the Shemah Prayer, and is as familiar to them as the Doxology is to Christians and the Sign of the Cross is to Catholics. It is typically the first prayer one learns to recite as a child and the last one recited as an adult. And, just as the Jewish community celebrates its most important religious tradition with Passover in the spring-time, so we celebrate Holy Week. But, both traditions observe another religious event, during the autumn. For Jews it is High Holy Days with the Day of Atonement as the most solemn day. For us, it is the Autumn Triduum with the Feast of All Saints as the centerpiece.

You might be asking, as some have done, “Why does Father Brown pay so much attention to 31 October, 1 and 2 November? Or, as others have asked: “What does Father have against Halloween?” Well, I do not have anything against Halloween; I enjoy harmless pranks, tricks, and treats as well as anybody. I do not like the violent, sinister, and terroristic elements that we see too much of in reality; we need not bring it into our recreational activity. It is also a distortion of the real meaning of the tradition and feeds the commercial aspects of the season. Most importantly the emphasis on Halloween by separating it from 1 and 2 November (all Saints/All Souls) causes us to miss a valuable opportunity for spiritual and emotional growth. I will repeat from last week the sentences about linking the days:

**All Hallows' Eve
31 October**

**All Hallows' (Saints') Day
1 November**

**All Souls Day
2 November**

This period of 72 hours on our Calendar of Worship, invites our reflection on a central element of our lives as Catholics, as Christians, as humans..... the very meaning of life and death. All human beings die and their lives in this world give meaning to their lives in the next. This fall triduum (3 days) has 1 November as the centerpiece, because sainthood/holiness is what we all strive for. The previous day, with all its secular and commercial distortions, recognizes the fact that we don't measure up to our calling to holiness; we pretend to be less than holy and sometimes we are in reality. The third, 2 November, suggests that even after we have physically left this world, the memories we have made and which live on after us, can contribute to the achievement of our ultimate goal.

I am absolutely convinced that I am spiritually and emotionally more successful at coping with the loss of loved ones in their deaths, and in preparing for my own, by the annual observance, prayerfully of these three days, by finding and keeping Jesus as the focus and source of meaning for this time of the year.

FAMILY-CENTERED FAITH FORMATION FOR CHILDREN

St. Ambrose faith formation is a family-centered program that provides families with age-appropriate materials for your children to learn about their faith at home on your own schedule. There are no class times (with the exception of Confirmation) and families can choose to participate in service activities that are offered through the parish twice a month if they choose. If your child is in need of a Sacrament, Father Ben will work one-on-one with your family (except Confirmation - see details below) in addition to the materials you work on at home.
