MESSAGE FROM FATHER BROWN

In the listing of Scripture citations at the top of this page, we are doing something a little out of the ordinary. We are captioning in italics one of the same passages which we highlighted in the space last week-end. I also want to repeat in writing the brief teaching which I spoke last week. I might have seemed a bit flippant as I referenced the reputation that we as Catholics have for the tolerance of adult beverages; I even told an anecdote about a woman who seemed to sincerely think it was part of official practice. It was not my intent to belittle her, and I certainly did not mean to gloss over the fact that abuse and addiction can be the source of enormous pain and tragedy. As a brief bible study, however, I am pointing out that our analysis of Mark 7:21, is pertinent to the discussion of Catholics and the use/abuse of one element of a huge local industry.

Another aspect of that conversation involves our knowledge of Sacred Scripture and our particular approach to the reading and interpretation of the Bible in general and the Gospels in particular. The other books of the New Testament such as the Epistles, The Acts of the Apostles, and The Book of Revelation are also great sources of instruction. Scripture along with Tradition provides what we refer to as the Two Source Theory, the basis of our religious teaching and practice. For the second of five consecutive weeks, we hear today from the Epistle of Saint James, who takes a very practical, down-to-earth approach to religion, and who provides another important source for the answers to some of our questions regarding faith, prayer, and religious teaching. James, with his emphasis on works of charity and compassion, is sometimes contrasted to Paul, who puts more of an emphasis on faith. Until very recent years this contrast accounted for much of the difference between Roman Catholic and Protestant traditions. As mentioned recently, I have completed ten of fourteen of the GIFT lessons which I began now many years ago. Two of them on the Bible are now available to you by email or hard copy.

This week-end and next week-end, you are being led in the celebration of Mass, by Carmelite Father Michael Greenwell; I introduced him to you back in July. A native of Louisville, Father Michael has served as a High School teacher, a Pastor, and a Police Force Chaplain in various places around the country. Let’s give a warm Hardin County WELCOME to Father Michael.
